The Wright Angle

Greetings, Church Family,

Churches are interesting creatures. They have history, personality, and distinct identities. Some are young, some are old, some are big, and some are small. All churches find themselves in one of two positions: they are either growing or shrinking. Shrinking is clearly concerning for churches because, like all living organisms, they do not want to die or be in poor health—they long to thrive and make

a mark on this world for the cause of Christ.

All churches start with the vibrancy and determination of a stubborn seed. They are typically planted in places where there are no others like them. This explains why there are so many "First" churches in communities. Like a healthy plant, new churches pop up full of zest for life, reaching for the sun, clear about their purpose, and looking out of place until they grow into beautiful "people gardens" and become part of the landscape of the communities where they take root.

Trinity certainly fits this model. For many decades, TUPC has been a beautiful "people garden" in the landscape of Modesto—always reaching for the sun, always seeking to fulfill the purpose for which we were planted, always serving Christ by serving others.

Now, I do not know much about plants (in fact, they often uproot themselves and run when they see me coming their way), but I do know that Christ compared the church and its effectiveness to plants—specifically fruit trees. We cannot escape the repeated teaching in both the Gospels and the writings of the Apostles that the church is planted to bear fruit. When a church bears fruit like a healthy tree, God is honored, and the life cycle of that tree is sustained. The fruit contains the seed, and the seed of today's harvest becomes the fruit of the future harvest.

But what does a church do when it produces no fruit? How will it re-seed? How will the next season of harvest be bountiful? Growing churches are constantly bearing fruit; shrinking churches are not. This is not rocket science—it is simply life. The purpose of the fruit tree was set by God in the first chapter of the Bible:

Is Christmas Over, yet?

How many of you still have a few random Christmas decorations up at home?

Are you still singing Christmas carols to yourself? Me? I still haven't taken down the hanging sleigh bells in my foyer and am considering leaving them up year-round... just in case I need them for a choir piece, right?

The question is often asked: When is the official end of Christmas? There are people who claim that Christmas is over on December 26th. Still, others stand by January 6th to include all 12 days of Christmas, marked by Epiphany. Then there are those who wait, and wait, and wait. Is there a religious reason to wait so long? [Drum roll, please!] The answer is, YES!

February 2nd is Candlemas! Yes, you read that word correctly... Candlemas! Many of you may be asking, What's Candlemas? Although said to be one of Christianity's earliest religious celebrations, there are not many denominations still observing Candlemas. Of course, those of us who take our time putting away Christmas decorations now have an official excuse!

In many traditions, Candlemas is known as the Feast of the Presentation. It reflects the day that Mary and Joseph took Jesus to the Temple in Jerusalem to be dedicated. If you read Leviticus 12, you'll see that women went to the temple for purification 40 days after giving birth. It was at that time that mothers took their newborns for dedication, consecration, and redemption in the temple.

Interestingly, there is some controversy as to whether Jesus was dedicated or simply presented on that day, as He had already been announced as the Son of God by the angel Gabriel and was born to redeem all of mankind. Why, then, is Candlemas called Candlemas? Wikipedia tells us this:

"The Roman church's custom of blessing candles by the clergy found its way to Germany. The German conclusion that if the sun appeared on Candlemas, a hedgehog would cast a shadow, making a 'second winter,' was the origin of the modern American festival of Groundhog Day, as many of Pennsylvania's early settlers were German."

The farmer's year began on Candlemas, and the servant's year ended. Also, the Virgin of Candelaria has been claimed in the Canary Islands to represent the candles and light.

So, there you have it! Candlemas on February 2nd marks the very last day of Christmas! Seeing the shadow of light on Candlemas or Groundhog Day, we'll know that the season is changing and that Lent is just around the corner. You can finally remove all of your Christmas decorations and prepare for spring! Before we know it, we will be singing of the joy of the resurrection at Easter!
