The Wright Connection

Dear Friends,

I don't often experience revelations from God, but this year in Guatemala, the Word of God unfolded before me in an unmistakable and unshakable way. This experience has emboldened me to ask for your support for the mission of Bethel Ministries International. The revelation was profound: I witnessed an Old Testament story come to life before my eyes. The characters were vividly portrayed, and then it struck me—suddenly and powerfully—that I was part of the story, and so are we all. Let me share this with you, and I pray that you, my dear friend, will enter this story with your whole heart.

I would like to introduce you to a mother and daughter we met in Chimaltenango. The mother is 54, a single mother of many children, but only one is still with her. Her daughter is 15 and realizes the future of her family rests squarely on her thin shoulders. While our team sat in a circle of resin chairs, this mother shared her life story with us. I have never heard such a harsh and heartbreaking story in my life. This woman, from the age of 14, was betrayed and violently abused by the men in her life, family, and strangers. She found herself used and cast aside by all who could help her. She was defiled and rejected, not because she earned the scorn of others with bad behavior, but because she was labeled unclean. At 14, her family turned their backs on her. She escaped to the city, looking for a man to take her in, to cover her, to feed her. Vulnerable, she remained an easy target for predators. It was not easy to listen to the story of her life. Tearfully, she asked our group, "What did I do to deserve this?" As she spoke, I thought there was no way she trusted God after all she had been through, but she did, she does. While we sat outside her modest home, a home that could be taken away from her at any time, my mind flashed to the story of Ruth. This is when the revelation started.

The story of Ruth is a common story in history—women who find themselves alone in a potentially violent world of sexual predators and starvation. This is so common in Guatemala, but it has been common throughout history in all places. Vulnerable women and children need a covering, someone, usually a man, to take them into their hearts and provide food, shelter, and clothing. Such was the story of Ruth and Naomi. Scripture tells us Naomi and her family left Israel for Moab because of a famine. Naomi left with her husband and two sons. While in Moab, her sons married, and all was well until Naomi's husband passed away, followed by her sons. Three women, Orpah, Ruth, and Naomi, were now left alone and exposed. Orpah moved back to her family while Ruth and Naomi headed back to Israel, seeking a potential husband for Ruth who would provide safety, food, and shelter. But as you read the story of Ruth, you can sense the danger under the surface for a young woman vulnerable to abuse. Ruth found Boaz, who became her "kinsman redeemer."

I realized in an instant that the parallels were striking. As in the book of Ruth, many women, often with a few children, find themselves alone in the world. They are abandoned by the men who impregnated them, often abandoned by the church, and sometimes even by their extended families. Alone, vulnerable,

and with mouths to feed, many of these women use their bodies to attract a man, hoping to find an anchor, a good guy who can be their redeemer, enough calories for another day. Those themes echo in Ruth. Yet, she found Boaz—a godly man, a kinsman redeemer. Why kinsman? Because Naomi was related in some way to Boaz. Why redeemer? Because Boaz, out of the kindness of his heart, out of his sense of responsibility and obedience to God, provided covering, protection, food, and a future for these vulnerable women.

As we listened to the life story of this precious woman, I wondered if her 15-year-old daughter would suffer the same fate as her mother. Then it hit me—another revelation—this mother and daughter had found a kinsman redeemer. They would be okay. Food, shelter, clothing, and school—a future and a hope. Who is that kinsman redeemer? Bethel Ministries International! And by extension, you and me. This 54-year-old woman and her 15-year-old daughter are kin, our family. How's that, you ask? They are followers of Jesus Christ, and our sisters in Christ—yes, kin! Because of the outreach of Bethel Ministries, because of social workers like Dulze Galvez, these two precious souls have found the church. And we, the church, are Boaz in this story. Once you get past the tragedy of their story, it turns to grace and hope. Grace and hope are provided by the people of God, by us. I will be preaching the book of Ruth in worship, and we will have this conversation as a church on Sunday, August 11th. But for now, I want to say thank you for your gifts given over the years to rescue these precious souls. We, the church, are actively engaged in redemption, and this pleases our Lord deeply. Please take the time to read the book of Ruth; it might take all of 10 minutes. I pray Christ will open all your hearts as our team shares in the coming days.

It's as if the nature here sings God's praises so clearly (well, okay, maybe not the geese... haha).

With two weeks of camp back-to-back for Rick Crabtree, Cassi Torrez, and me, our schedules have been packed with activities, hikes, team bonding, worship, devotionals, chants, and a little bit of sleep—wherever we can find it... it is almost easy to miss it by not taking a moment to stop to just soak it all in, to breathe it all in.

This summer, Calvin Crest's theme of Relentless Love, centered around the story of Jonah. Hearing and participating in the discussions about how God's love pursues us and how He continues to pour out grace so freely has been incredible to be a part of. Every team member came home with stories that gripped their heart. Be sure to reach out to them. Have Dave Zellman share with you Maria's hope for her daughter's health when the doctors say there is no hope. Bryan Crabtree was moved by the energy and drive to live of the two young brothers with muscular dystrophy. Let Debbie Chin show you the beautiful picture of the little girl who cannot speak or the triplets in need formula and diapers.



Hear Rick Crabtree's heart break over the trauma of Norma's life and the cancer she is now dealing with. Experience the gratitude of Estafani in her new home that Jeff Chin witnessed.



Ask Marcy Wright about Nayeli having her one-year-old removed from the home due to severe malnutrition and now not being able to produce milk or afford to buy formula for her newborn.



Listen as Pastor Craig shares the message of the kinsman-redeemer (August 11th) that Astrid and Anna inspired. Hear about the dreams of going to school to break out of the cycle of poverty. Sit down with Jon Bucknell and let him tell you why he keeps going back to touch the lives of these beautiful people.

There is still work to be done and what a privilege to play a small part in bringing hope to their situation. We can find the means to help ease the expense of food, formula, or diapers. We can provide doctor's visits for the malnourished children full of parasites. We can arrange for transportation. And we can encourage the dream of going to school to escape the cycle of poverty. Even though we are home, the work continues and TUPC is an ongoing part of that work. Would you prayerfully consider meeting one of the needs we encountered and make plans to join us in Guatemala June 10-17, 2025. The needs waiting to be met are as follows:

Don Joel (68) has a bone infection in his leg that needs to be examined. He and his wife need a food sponsor @ \$50 per month and medicine @ \$85 per month

Erica and Domingo's triplet babies – need formula for 6 mos @ \$160 per month and diapers

6 year old Mirna needs seizure medication @ \$50 month and older sister Damaris (17) wants to study English to be a secretary, her training would cost approximately \$80 per month

Norma is a cancer patient who needs transportation money (\$60 one time) to and from the hospital for surgery. (Government is covering medical)

Irma has 2 special needs sons and needs \$100 to help purchase medicine

Elida has diabetes and her medicine and pressure sore treatments cost \$110 per month

Olinda is a single mother with kidney failure and two teenage sons–they need a monthly food sponsor @ \$50/month

Mirian needs seizure medicine for her younger son @ \$50 per month, and an education sponsor for her older son @ \$50/ month

Irma Ajabaj is a single mother of a down syndrome daughter. She needs a bed for her daughter at \$150, and a food sponsor@ \$50/ month.

Olga has a special needs son. He needs diapers at \$130/month-and she needs help restocking her micro store @ \$250 (one time)

Josefina lost her sister and son to renal failure. She needs \$900 to pay off a loan for burying her son, and she needs a food sponsor @ \$50/month.

Isolina's 13-year-old daughter needs an education sponsor @ \$50/month

Maria needs a food sponsor \$50/month, and a pediatrician visit for 7 grandchildren with malnutrition for \$1000 (one time)

Leonarda – needs a food sponsor @ \$50/ month, a pediatrician visit for 11-year-old granddaughter Marjorie for \$150 (one time)

Saturnina needs school sponsors for two grandsons Hector (12) \$50/month and Remigio (15) \$50/month

Jennifer (18) and Edwin (12) need school sponsors \$50/month each

Nayeli and Jose need a food sponsor @ \$50/month, and their newborn Jose Jr. needs a formula sponsor \$50/month

Darlyn needs a food sponsor @ \$50/month Jesus needs a food sponsor @ \$50/month

Anna needs to have hernia surgery @ \$90 and she needs a series of shots @ \$245. Her daughter Astrid needs a school sponsor @ \$50 to \$100 per month. This family is \$180 behind in rent and it urgently needs to be covered
